Chairman's Introduction



In the first Quarter of this calendar year, January to March 2024, our wonderful volunteering dental practitioners have generously delivered pro bono dental care to the value of some \$280K. Our New South Wales volunteers are delivering again now that Filling the Gap (FTG), the charity set up by ADANSW has ironed out some of the roadblocks which led to a very quiet December Quarter last year. FTG coordinates the ADADHF dental aid programmes in NSW now. All other States delivered excellent results too.

I commend all our State Coordinators and State Committees who work hard to connect our volunteer dentals with the many patients referred by all the charities who rely of the Foundation and its networks for pro bono dental care for their clients.

It is a sad duty to report that our National Manager of the past couple of years, Ms Claire Rawlinson has resigned for personal reasons. Claire will be fondly remembered, not only for her drive and enthusiasm as National Manager, but also as a very effective NSW State Coordinator before she took up the National role. I reflect that the last couple of years have brought the challenges of rebranding, regular Advisory Board changes and changes in the ADA supporting staff. Nevertheless, Claire steered the volunteering programmes to our most productive year in 2022/23 when our volunteers delivered in excess of \$1.4M of pro bono dental care. Well done Claire and our team! We are in the process of recruiting a new national manager.

The Foundation at the time of writing is receiving nominations for the First Nations Student grants for dental hygienists and oral health therapists. Next month we shall open applications for the 2024 Healthier Smiles Community Service Grants which we offer with the support of the Mars Wrigley Foundation.

I wish to thank sincerely Ms Lynda Cunningham, our State Co-ordinator for both Victoria and Tasmania for stepping into the breach in the absence of a National Manager to collate the data and stories for this Quarterly Impact Report.

Creating impact with the ADA Dental Health Foundation

Our mandate is to improve the oral health of Australians who cannot easily access or afford dental care. We want better access to quality dental care for all Australians regardless of their financial, geographical or social situation.

From men and women who have overcome addiction, who are enduring long-term economic hardship or suffering from mental and physical health challenges to those establishing their independence after domestic violence has stolen their freedom, and the homeless whose needless dental suffering no longer compounds their more basic struggles, we are there to provide life changing oral health treatment wherever we can help.

Through our Dental Rescue Days[®], Adopt a Patient and Rebuilding Smiles[®] programs, our national team connects eligible individuals with specialist oral health volunteers who provide their time, expertise and practice facilities at no cost to patients.

We also fund programs that facilitate better long-term oral health outcomes through our Healthier Smiles Community Service Grants and Oral Health Education Projects and reduce the inequality of access to education through our Indigenous Study Grants.

To date, we have created change for thousands of community members by enabling the pro bono delivery of **more than \$7,000,000** of professional oral health services.

We would like to thank all of our volunteers and their dental practices for making our programs possible as well as those individuals and companies who generously offer in-kind donations and financial support to our programs.

Volunteer Program Outcomes

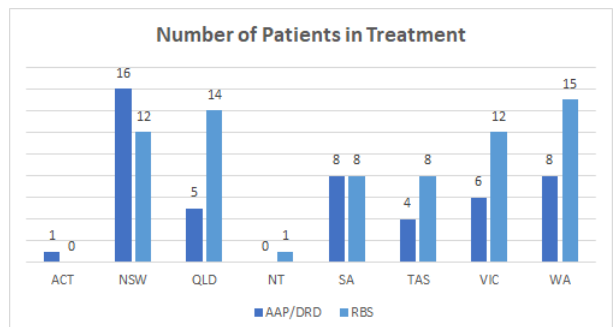
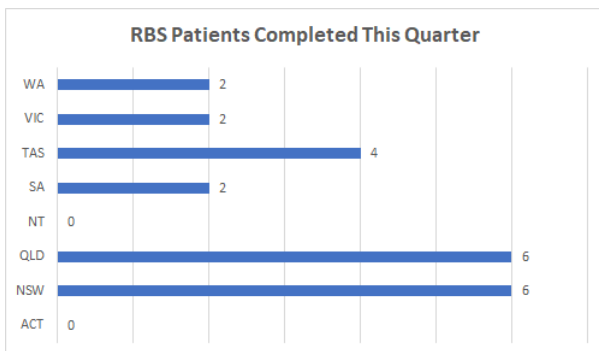
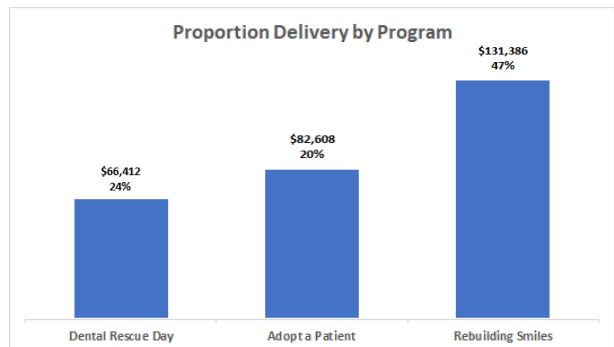
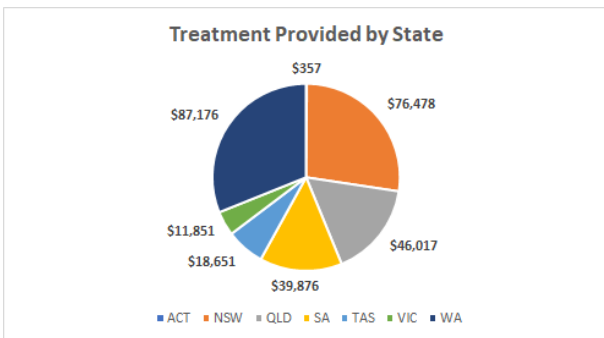
In this third quarter of financial year 2024 (Jan-Mar) the Foundation coordinated **nine Dental Rescue Days®** around Australia, providing 109 appointments to disadvantaged patients. The Dental Rescue Day® program coordinates access to local private practices and clinics for eligible patients, whereby a group of patients will receive a comprehensive general oral check-up in a single day as well as treatment for acute concerns.

219 appointments were attended by patients under the **Adopt a Patient** program. In this program, an individual patient attends a local private practice or clinic to receive dental treatment and will usually require several appointments to address their often more complex oral health issues. Currently there are **48** patients being treated under the AAP program in practices throughout Australia.

The **Rebuilding Smiles®** program focuses on providing assistance to individuals and families who have experienced family and domestic violence. During this quarter, **22** cases were completed with **70** patients currently connected to a practice or receiving treatment.

Across all three volunteer programs, pro bono treatment of **\$280,406** has been delivered by our volunteer general practitioners and specialists during the quarter.

Treatment Delivered by State



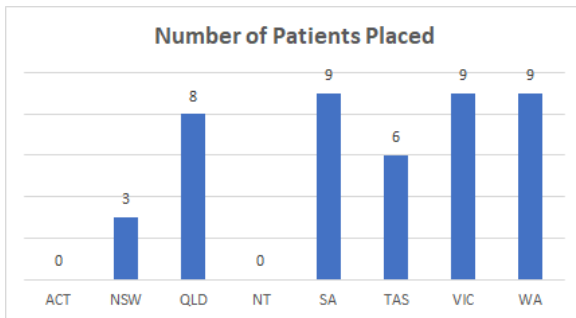
Volunteers

During the quarter, **106 general dentists, prosthetists and specialists** around Australia provided pro bono services to patients. Additionally, many of their staff were involved with coordinating appointments, assisting in surgery and providing oral hygiene and education to patients.

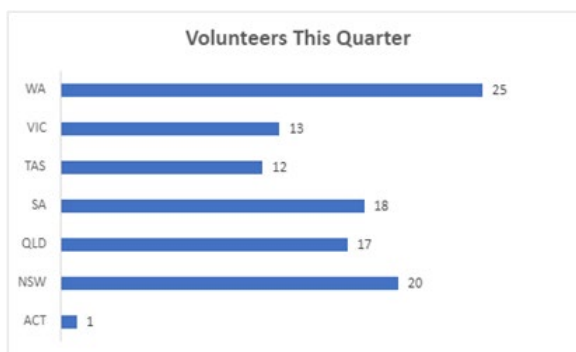
